

Collaborative Cohort PhDs at QUT



Sri Lanka, through the UGC and the Ministry of Higher Education (MoHE), wishes to enhance the research skills of its academic staff by offering PhD scholarships to increase the number of doctorate level academics.

QUT wishes to increase its international collaborative research through strategic partnerships with the UGC and Sri Lankan universities. QUT is a leading technology university with research strengths in science, technology, engineering and health sciences.

QUT-UGC collaborative PhD programs include the joint PhD model initiated in partnership with the University of Colombo (UoC), University of Peradeniya (UoP) and University of Sri Jayewardenepura (SJP).

Focusing on strategic and innovative research relevant to the Sri Lankan context, the Joint PhD program provides the opportunity for doctoral students to undertake research to relevant projects that are international research priorities. The dominant focus of the research will involve data collection and/or field work experimentation in Sri Lanka. The collaborations between all Universities involved are enhanced and candidates will receive collegial support from the cohort model.

QUT supports a cohort model of doctoral supervision, whereby 10-12 candidates of different disciplines from Sri Lankan Universities undertake a minimum of 12 months of their doctoral studies on a QUT campus.

This approach is taken to minimise administrative costs and to facilitate timely completion at both the Sri Lankan universities and QUT. It will enhance the quality of learning and research outcomes anticipated from joint and/or split PhD study models.

Joint PhD students will be co-supervised by two QUT academics, one academic from UoC, UoP or SJP, and another academic from the candidate's home University if applicable. Split PhD students will have two QUT academic supervisors and a local supervisor. Split PhD students should obtain written approval of their release from all academic and administrative duties for the duration of their PhD degree.

The UGC will provide financial support to Sri Lankan academics who meet UGC and QUT eligibility requirements to cover expenses while they attend and undertake research at QUT for one year. This support includes a living allowance, Overseas Student Health Cover (OSHC) and associated incidental costs as required as per the UGC guidelines.

QUT will provide a full tuition fee sponsorship (valued at approximately AUD100,000) for the duration of the PhD candidature (up to three years).

Joint and Split PhD models are supported with UGC funding to cover the PhD student's costs including health insurance, project overheads (case-by-case basis), living stipend during the period of residency in Australia, and visa application costs within UGC approved limits.
